

People around the world are starting to build a better future.


We want to learn from their efforts and take a lead in carrying this momentum forward.






Branch offices


















Famous Places to Visit in Edogawa City

1. Zenyo-ji Temple



Yogo-no-matsu at Zenyo-ji Temple



Yogo-no-matsu (pine tree)

Zenyo-ji Temple is famous for its large black pine tree that is over 600 years old.

The branches extend up to 28 meters in the east-west direction and 32 meters in the north-south direction. The area covered by the branches is the largest in Japan. It was designated as a national natural treasure in 2011.

It is called "Yogo-no-matsu" for its magnificent appearance. ("Yogo" means a god or Buddha appearing in this world.)

The temple had another pine tree called "Hoshikudari-matsu."

It was an old and large tree, which was 600 years old and 30 meters tall, but died from the damage caused by a typhoon in 1940. Today, the second Hoshikudari-matsu planted in 1953 is growing large.

Yogo-no-matsu and Hoshikudarimatsu are the same black pine, but the shapes are greatly different. Come look at them and compare their shapes. It's interesting!

• Walking along the small

shrines representing the 88 temples on Shikoku Island

It is and has been said in Japan that if you make a pilgrimage to the 88 temples on Shikoku Island and pray, 88 worldly desires (badness that disturbs, contaminates, or troubles your mind) will disappear and your wishes will come true.

In the precincts of Zenyo-ji Temple, there is a small path, along which small shrines (places to enshrine gods and Buddha) have been erected. Sand collected from the 88 temples on Shikoku Island is buried underneath each shrine. It is said that if you walk and say a prayer along the path, it has the same effect as though you had made pilgrimages to the 88 temples in Shikoku.

A Buddha statue for rubbing (called Binzuru-sama) sits outside the hall. It is said that if you rub the same part of the statue as your body part that has an illness or injury, you will be cured.

You may enter the precincts when the temple gate is open. Admission is free.

You can eat a box lunch sitting on a bench or drop by to have a rest while out for a walk.

2. Nagisa Park

Nagisa Pony Land

A waterfront park in the Sogo Recreation Park is named Nagisa Pony Land, where children up to elementary school level students can ride a pony free of charge. Many people visit the park on weekends.

The staff gently and attentively cares for the seven ponies and two goats every day.

All ponies are different in size and character.

"Goma-kun is a little easy to scare, but kind to people and very popular.



Visitors can touch and ride ponies that vary in their characteristics.

Sakura-chan often carries a baby on her back. She is so considerate as to walk slowly, keeping pace with the mother who is following her baby. Plum was born here and has been known since she was a baby, so people often talk to her."

There are a variety of places to visit in this large park. It is recommended that one go on a pony ride after playing in the athletic facilities, or, if it is in spring, take a walk in Nagisa Park where Kawazu cherry blossoms are in bloom and then meet the ponies.

It must be very rare to find a place that is so close to the city center and where you can meet animals of this size. We hope many of you enjoy meeting them. Come and see our ponies! They are full of vigor.

Canoe Trial Lesson for Residents



Edogawa City hosted the canoe slalom competition at the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020. Taking this as an opportunity, Edogawa aims to become a "City of Canoeing" and is endeavoring to build an environment where residents can enjoy canoeing. As the base for this aspiration, the Shinsakongawa Shinsui Park Canoe Area was opened in 2019.

Designed for beginners, the multipurpose canoeing area is where they can experience canoeing casually without making a reservation. Canoes and life jackets can be rented, and visitors can go empty-handed, which is quite nice. You will be given brief instructions on how to row a canoe. If you would like to learn more, it is recommended that you take a trial lesson provided by the City.

There are two types of canoes: solo and tandem. A tandem canoe is more stable and therefore recommended for beginners. Children three years old and above can ride a tandem with an adult. In this way, people of all ages can enjoy canoeing.

Enjoy the pleasure of paddling, while feeling the rich nature of Japan such as cherry blossoms in spring and the lush green of trees in early summer. Guidance in English is available for the convenience of non-Japanese speakers. Come enjoy an unusual experience in your neighborhood.

4. Daini Kotobukiyu (public bath)

The painting of Mt. Fuji is renewed at intervals of about one year.



Daini Kotobukiyu is a historic public bath that opened in 1964. The curtain hung at the entrance is the public bathhouse's original and is replaced seasonally. When you enter the entrance, you will find a bandai, or watcher's seat (a place to collect admission fees and watch over the baths), in front of you. Pay the admission fee to the watcher. Today, baths having a watcher's seat are only about 10% of all baths in Tokyo. The large bathtubs in the bathroom are an ore bath and electric bath. In the smaller bathtub, you can enjoy hot medicinal water that is changed daily. Using a large bathtub is an extraordinary experience. Soaking in it makes you feel good and relaxed.

One of the highlights is the painting of Mt. Fuji on the interior wall. In a traditional public bath, you can enjoy seeing the painting of Mt. Fuji while soaking in a bathtub. The painting was painted by a painter specialized in the painting of public baths. Each public bath has different paintings. It must be fun to visit many public baths and compare them with one another.

If it is your first visit to a public bath, talk to the storekeeper or people nearby and say, "I don't know how to use it. Will you tell me how?" Everyone is nice and willing to teach you things!

Body soap, shampoo, and makeup remover are available. Towels are sold for 100 yen, so you can go there empty-handed, bringing nothing else but yourself. Enjoy Japan's traditional public bath, or sento.

5. Genshin-an Japanese Style House (in Gyosen Park)







Genshin-an Japanese Style House



Genshin-an Japanese Style House is a traditional Japanese *sukiya*-style building surrounded by trees and water.

In the old days, Japanese people often watched the moon in the sky at night (called *otsukimi*). From the balcony that juts out over the pond, you can see the beautiful moon reflected in the pond.

Sitting in the room named "Tsuki no Ma (room of the moon)," you can also enjoy the view of the large pond and the flowers and trees of the season. Rooms are available for rent (charged and reservation required).

Many people use them to enjoy traditional Japanese culture, including tea ceremonies, *shigin* (a performance reciting a Japanese poem), a *koto* (Japanese harp) concert, and *monko* (enjoying the scent of fragrant wood).

You may hesitate to enter the building, but you can use the rooms simply for spending a relaxing time there. You are allowed to bring food. It is a good idea to enjoy both lunch and beautiful scenery through the window with your family members and friends.

However, loud voices and noise are not allowed. You cannot bring alcohol. You must take all your garbage back home with you.

Enjoy the quiet Japanese garden, while observing rules and manners.

6. Tokyo Sea Life Park







Tokyo Sea Life Park



In the huge glass dome, 30.7 meters high above the ground, visitors will meet more than 600 kinds of sea life from around the world.

In the Park, the environments of the world's seven oceans are reproduced. It is recommended by the staff that one join the guided tours accompanied by experts and visit the waterfront nature area. Although not many people visit the area, it has an artificial river running within it, and the waterfront of Tokyo before the high economic growth period is reproduced.

Tuna fish swimming in the large aquarium in the Tokyo Sea Life Park is world famous. Currently, about 80 bluefin tunas are swimming in the 2,200-ton aquarium. The staff checks the health of the tunas every day, confirming that they are swimming as usual and not injured. Enjoy the sight of tuna swimming powerfully in schools as well as the world of sea life.

The number of penguins you can see is also one of the largest in Japan. You will meet some of four species of penguins (Humboldt, southern rockhopper, fairy and king penguins), depending on the season. The penguins' behavior both on land and in the water can be observed. It is fun to compare the different characteristics of the four species.

7. Kasai Rinkai Park



In the large park on the sea, there are a big Ferris wheel, Tokyo Sea Life Park, a bird sanctuary, barbecue facilities, and a City-owned hotel.

With a height of 117 meters, this is one of the largest Ferris wheels in Japan. On a sunny day, you can see famous landmarks in and around Tokyo, such as the Tokyo Sky Tree, Tokyo Tower, and Umihotaru, as well as Mt. Fuji in the distance. At night, you can also enjoy the romantic night view of the heart of Tokyo. Enjoy a grand and comfortable 17-minute trip in the air.

• Hotel Seaside Edogawa

Hotel Seaside Edogawa is located in Kasai Rinkai Park. Have a relaxing time in the hotel surrounded by trees and the sea, or play at recreational facilities nearby. Enjoy a pleasant time with your family and friends here.

8. Kasai Kaihin Park







Kasai Rinkai and Kaihin Parks



The Kasai Kaihin Park consists of two artificial seashores. At Nishi Nagisa (west seashore), you can gather clams or enjoy fishing and barbecue.

A variety of living things are in the mudflats, including hard clams and sand bubbler crabs. To conserve the natural environment, you are not allowed to enter Higashi Nagisa (east seashore). In 2018, it was registered as the first wetlands under the Ramsar Convention in Tokyo.

Every year, many migratory birds come here to have a rest or overwinter.

Lost property

There are many *Koban* (police boxes) in Japan. In each police box, police officers work to protect your life and way of life. If you lose something valuable or find a lost item belonging to another, go to a police box.



Fire

You must take special care during winter in Japan, when the air is dry and a fire easily breaks out.

To prevent fire

 Do not throw cigarette butts on the ground.



- Do not smoke in bed.
- Clean power outlets to prevent the buildup of dust.
- Make sure any fire or flame is extinguished before going out or going to bed.
- Do not use spray cans near naked flames.

If you find a fire

• Shout out, "Kaji-da! (Fire!)" to alert people around you that there is a fire.



- Call 119 immediately.
- Attempt to extinguish the fire using fire extinguishers or water.



- If oil catches fire, do not pour water on it. Use a fire extinguisher.
- If you feel you are in danger, flee immediately.
- If you need to escape through smoke, cover your nose and mouth with a wet handkerchief and keep your body low.
- Do not use elevators. Use stairs to evacuate.






Prepare to protect your safety.

- Prepare food and water for about 3 days to a week as well as batteries and a flashlight.
- •Put necessary items into a bag (emergency bag) so that you can take it out quickly when you need to escape.



































• Check dangerous places and shelters in advance.

Ask neighbors in advance to provide you help if an earthquake or other disaster should occur.

Decide where you will evacuate to in case of an earthquake or other disaster and simulate walking there as you would during a disaster.

The Flood Hazard Map shows the locations where there is a risk of flooding and where to evacuate.

The Flood Hazard Map is available in Japanese, English, Chinese, and Korean. It is available at the Edogawa City Office and other branch offices. It can also be downloaded from the City's website.

When a disaster strikes

Typhoon and torrential rain

- Stay in a building when there is torrential rain or strong wind.
- If there is a risk of flooding, evacuate with your emergency bag.

Earthquake

If you are at home or in a building

- Protect yourself by taking cover under a table, for example.
- After the shaking stops, turn off the stove and heater.
- Open windows and doors immediately to secure an exit. Doors may not open after a quake.
- Before evacuating to outside the building, turn off the circuit breaker.

If you are outside a building

- Cover your head with a bag etc. to prevent injury caused by falling objects and flee to a safe place.
- In a residential area, move away immediately from concrete block walls, gates, and other objects that may topple over or fall.



Resident registration (notification of your moving in, moving out, or change of address)

If you want to take up residence in Japan, you need to notify the local government. If any of the following applies to you, go to the Edogawa City Office or other branch office to complete the necessary procedures.

- If you live in Edogawa City immediately after entering Japan
- If you move to Edogawa City from another municipality
- If you move to outside Edogawa City
- If you move within Edogawa City
- If you are qualified as a mid- to long-term resident in Japan

For the procedures, your residence card, passport, etc. are required.

Family register (notification of birth, death, marriage, and divorce)

If any of the following applies to you, go to the Edogawa City Office or other branch office nearby to complete the necessary procedures.

- When a child has been born
- When a family member living in Japan has died
- When you get married in Japan
- When you divorce in Japan

Seal registration

A seal registered with a public organization such as ward, city, town, or village is called a *jitsuin* or a registered seal.

If you need to register your seal or need a certificate of seal registration, go to the Edogawa City Office or other branch office to complete the necessary procedures.

For the procedures, a seal to be registered and a residence card or special permanent resident certificate is required.



Opening a bank account

Requirements for opening a bank account

- 1. Passport
- 2. Residence card
- 3. Seal (Signatures are acceptable in place of seals.) *Necessary items and screening criteria vary among financial institutions.

What is an inkan (or hanko)?

It is a seal. Outside Japan, signatures are often affixed when concluding contracts. In Japan, however, seal impressions are used in place of signatures.

There are various types of seals, and they are sold at physical and internet stores.













Types of housing







Private housing

A house/apartment leased out by an owner (landlord)

Public housing

A house/apartment leased out by the Tokyo Metropolitan Government or the City

- You can rent it at a lower rental rate, even when you do not have much money.
- There are various rules you must follow while renting it.

• UR rental housing

A house/apartment for rent by the Urban Renaissance Agency. It is also available to foreign nationals, although there are various rules.

Words You Often See and Hear When Looking for a House/Apartment

• Fudosan-ya (real estate agencies)

They are agencies that present various houses/apartments to people who want to rent or buy them. If you are looking for a house/apartment, go and consult with them.

Ohya (landlord)

The person who owns and leases the houses/apartments to you. If you have a problem, consult with them. Call them "Ohya-san."

Yachin/Chin-ryo (rent)

Money you pay each month for the house/ apartment you rent

Rentai-hoshonin (co-signer)

A person who is obliged to pay rent when the renter is unable to pay the rent

Shiki-kin/Hosho-kin (deposit)

Money you pay when you start renting a house/apartment, the amount of which is equivalent to the rent for one to two months. It is used when the renter is unable to pay the rent or when the landlord fixes a damaged or dirty part of the room/apartment/house after the renter has moved out.

The money the landlord did not use will be given back to you after you have moved out.

Rei-kin (key money)

Money you pay to the landlord as a thank-you when you decide to rent a house/apartment, the amount of which is equivalent to the rent for one to two months.

Chukai-tesuryo (commission to a real-estate agency)

Money you pay to the real-estate agency that presented the house/apartment to you when you have decided to rent the property

Kanri-hi/Kyoeki-hi (common area charge)

Money you pay for the management of the shared facilities of the apartment or condo. It is collected from the residents and used for the payment of electricity and cleaning in the shared areas, including stairs and corridors.

• Koshin-ryo (renewal charge)

Money you pay in addition to the rent if you continue to live in the same house/ apartment after completing the term of your lease.

How to separate and dispose of waste

Household waste shall be separated into combustible waste, non-combustible waste, and resources.

Waste collection days are determined by area.

Waste shall be taken out by 08:00 on the determined days of the week. For details, read the brochure titled "Basic Rules for the Disposal of Resources and Waste."

Combustible waste

Put it in a transparent or translucent bag and take it out.



Food waste, waste paper, disposable diapers (remove dirt), clothing, edible oil (blot it with paper or cloth, or make it solid), tree branches, flowers (cut them into about 30 cm and bundle them together), dirty plastic waste with recycling symbols, plastic waste with silver-colored parts or without recycling symbols, and rubber/leather products

Non-combustible waste

Put it in a transparent or translucent bag and take it out.



Metal products the plastic parts of which

cannot be removed, small home appliances less than 30 cm in length, china and porcelain, glass, knives, metals, dry batteries, spray cans, lighters (empty the lighter by burning off the fuel and separate it from other waste when taking it out), and light bulbs and fluorescent lamps (put them in paper cases)

Resources



Recyclable plastic containers and packaging

Put them in a transparent or translucent bag and take them out.

(Containers and packaging with recycling symbols and without stains or silver-colored parts are treated as resources.)

Plastic cups, caps, bottles, trays, packing containers, protective materials, shopping bags, outer bags, labels, etc.

1. PET bottles

Put them in a PET bottle net (green) and take them out.

(PET beverage bottles with PET recycling symbols)

Bottles for juice, tea, isotonic drinks, alcohol, soy sauce, mentsuyu (noodle soup base), mirin (sweet sake), etc.

Bottles

Put them in a yellow container and take them out.

(Glass bottles for beverage and food)

Bottles for beverages such as juice, alcohol, and wine, and bottles and iars for food such as jam and seasoning

·Cans

Put them in a blue container and take them out.

(Aluminum and steel cans for beverages and

Cans for beverages such as juice and beer Cans for food such as tea leaves, laver, and cookies

•Used paper (Separate it according to the following categories, bundle each of them and take them out.)

(Newspaper (and inserts), magazines, miscellaneous paper, cardboard and paper beverage cartons (white inside))





Things to note when you are looking for a house/apartment to live in

- 1. You may not allow others to live in the house/apartment you are renting without permission.
- 2. It is very likely that you will not be allowed to have pets in an apartment. Check before you sign the contract if you have or intend to keep a pet/pets.
- * If there is something you do not know, do not hesitate to ask your real estate agency about it.

Things to note for your daily life

- Japanese people value relationships with neighbors. Try to build good relationships with your neighbors in your day-to-day life.
- 2. Walls in Japanese buildings are thin. Do not make loud noises in an apartment (loud voices, sound from the television, music, etc.). Do not make loud noises even outdoors. It is a nuisance to your neighbors. Always be mindful.

- Do not leave things outside your apartment (in a common area).
- Take off your shoes at the entrance of a Japanese house/ apartment.
- 5. Keep your room neat and clean.
 - Do not pour food or oil into a kitchen drain.
 - Do not remove wallpaper, hammer in nails, or paint the room. You may be charged a large amount of money to restore the room to its original condition.

Join a neighborhood community association.

COLUMN on Japanese Culture

Customs differ from country to country.

There is a neighborhood community association (called *chokai* or *jichikai*) in each area of Japan. People are engaged in a variety of activities to make the community safer and more comfortable.

*You are required to pay membership fees.

What is good about joining such an association?

- •You can help each other in the event of a disaster.
- You can prevent crimes in the community by getting to know one another.
- You can make the community litterfree and clean.

 You can participate in events that you and neighbors can enjoy together.

 You can get various kinds of information concerning daily life in the community as soon as possible.

Join a neighborhood community association and cooperate with one another as members of the same community.

Be on time and keep your promises.

Japanese people are punctual. A typical example is trains coming on time.

They believe that punctuality is an expression of courtesy and should be observed without exception.

Being late for school or work leads to loss of credibility. If it is inevitable that you will be late, tell them that you will be late.

Relationships with others

In Japan, older and more experienced people are often considered as those who have contributed to society longer and are valued more than younger and less experienced people. Also, at school, use polite language for senior students.

People also tend to keep some distance and become modest with people they meet for the first time.

It takes time for them to develop a relationship from "acquaintance" to "friend" and then to one where they can speak what they think and be straightforward to the other.

Japanese people value harmony and cooperation and try to avoid quarrels where possible.





Be careful about ambiguous expressions.

Japanese people tend not to give clear-cut yes or no answers and to guess each other's intentions from facial expressions or the context of conversations. "lidesu," "Kekkodesu" and "Daijobudesu" can have opposite meanings and even a Japanese finds it difficult to grasp the true meaning. In order to avoid a conflict of opinions, they often do not say what they think straightforwardly and try to communicate it in a roundabout way. When you do not understand their intention, ask it on-the-spot.

In Japan, it is generally preferred to use gentle expressions such as "it would be better if you could..." than to express one's opinion clearly and directly.





There are public baths called *sento* or *onsen* in Japan. Edogawa City has a lot of *sentoes*. (Daini Kotobukiyu is introduced on page 14.)

Manners when taking a bath

- Wash your body before you enter a bathtub.
- -> This is to keep the hot water in the bathtub clean, because it is used by all.
- Avoid splashing shower water or soap lather on persons around you.
- •Rinse with clean hot water the wash bowls and chairs you used.
- Do not put your towel in a bathtub.
- Long hair should be put up.
- •Wipe your body thoroughly before returning to the changing room.
- Do not use a washbasin or hair dryer for a long time, when the changing room is congested.

Follow the rules of the public bath and make it a comfortable place for everyone.

COLUMN on Japanese Culture

Japanese Table Manners

Hold the bowl with your hand

In Japan, when eating rice or miso soup, you must hold and lift the bowl with your hand. It is considered bad manners to eat with the dish on the table, head down, and mouth close to the food (*inugui* in Japanese). When food is served on a large plate, whether it is a Japanese or non-Japanese meal, it is eaten without holding the plate.

Manners when using chopsticks Example of bad manners

Nigiri-bashi

Gripping two chopsticks together with one hand



Tsuki-bashi or Sashi-bashi Stabbing a piece of food with chopsticks



Awase-bashi or Hashi-watashi
 Passing a piece of food from chopsticks to chopsticks



Mayoi-bashi

Hovering chopsticks over several plates, without being able to decide which dish to eat.



Yose-bashi

Pulling a plate or bowl towards you with chopsticks



How to eat noodles

Japanese noodles such as soba, udon, and ramen can be slurped noisily but spaghetti cannot.



Train

Tokyo's transportation system is punctual and convenient no matter where you want to go. Commuter passes and economical one-day passes are available for the travel on trains and buses.

• How to ride


 Buy a ticket to your destination. (If you have a public transport smart card, go straight to the ticket gate.)



• Stand in line when waiting for a train on a station platform.



 Always wait for other passengers to get off before you get on the train.

Priority seats

Train cars and buses have priority seats. Priority is given to the elderly, those who are injured or ill, those with babies, and expectant mothers. Turn off your mobile phones when the train car is congested and you are near the priority seats.

• Women-only car

Women-only cars were introduced to prevent nuisances to women and to ensure safety for women in cars.

This car is also available for elementary schoolchildren or younger, and people with physical disabilities and those assisting them.




• How to ride

•Wait at the bus stop that indicates your destination.




 The destination is displayed on the upper front part of the bus.
 Get on a bus through the front door and exit through the rear door in the 23 Cities of Tokyo.



• Pay the fare in advance when you get on the bus.



• Fares may be fixed or incremental according to the distance. (A public transport smart card is useful.)



 Press the "Get off" button when you are approaching the bus stop of your destination.



Taxi

• How to ride

 Go to a taxi station at a train station or hotel.



• Tell the driver where you want to go. (Only a few drivers speak foreign languages. If you are not fluent in Japanese, prepare something with your destination written on it and hand it to the driver.)






• When you arrive at the destination, pay the taxi fare to the driver.



- ★Japanese taxi doors open automatically. You need not open it yourself.
- ★A 20% late-night surcharge applies from 22:00 to 5:00.

On foot

- •Walk along a sidewalk.
- •Where there is no sidewalk, walk on the right side of the road.




- If you want to cross a street, cross where there is a traffic light or use a crosswalk.
- Do not cross where there is a "no pedestrian crossing" sign.



No pedestrian crossing sign

 At a crosswalk, tell the drivers of cars or motorcycles that you are crossing by raising your hand or making eye contact with the driver. Then, make sure that the overall road conditions are safe before crossing.




- Even while you are crossing, check carefully if a car or motorcycle is approaching.
- Do not cross a railroad crossing when the alarm is sounding or the railroad crossing gate arm begins to descend.



Bicycle

Bicycles are in the same category as cars by law.



• As shown in the picture above, run the left side of the roadway.



- ↑ Wherever you see this sign, you may ride a bicycle on the sidewalks.
- Ride slowly so that you can stop quickly.
- If you are going to cause disturbance to pedestrians, get off your bicycle or stop it.

[You can go along sidewalks in the following cases.]

- If you are under 12 years old, 70 years old and over or with physical disabilities.
- When it is considered inevitable to protect the safety of the bicycle rider

Rules for riding bicycles

• It is prohibited for two persons to ride on one bicycle.



- *When carrying a child/children, use a bicycle specially designed to carry up to two children.
 - Do not run alongside other bicycles.



• Do not ride a bicycle after drinking.



 Riding a bicycle gripping the handle only with one hand is dangerous.
 Do not hold an umbrella or use a smart/mobile phone while riding a bicycle.



 At night and when it is dark, turn the headlight on.



 All riders, regardless of age, must endeavor to wear helmets when riding bicycles.

Bicycle Navigation Lines

What Bicycle Navigation Marks and Lines mean

These clearly show the part of the road along which bicycles should run and the direction in which they should move. Bicycles must travel in the direction of the arrow. (Going in the reverse direction is prohibited.)

Bicycle Navigation Marks and Lines are designed to inform bicycle riders of the instructions on traffic specified in the Road Traffic Act in an easy-to-understand way and to increase their effectiveness.

They are not traffic signs that indicate new traffic methods or penalties.

Edogawa Bicycle Rental (e-Cycle)

Rental bicycles are available at 11 bicycle parking lots in front of railway stations in Edogawa City.

The rental fee is 210 yen per day for a standard bicycle and 340 yen per day for a power-assisted bicycle. Bicycles can be rented and returned at any bicycle parking lots in front of railway stations. You need to make a bicyclerental registration card. Bring your ID such as residence card or driver's license when you rent it for the first time.




Car

When you drive a car

•A driver's license is required.



- Do not drive a car if you do not have your driver's license with you (if you left it at home, for example).
 Drive on the left side of a road. Drive
- Drive on the left side of a road. Drive slowly when you pass pedestrians or bicycles.



•All drivers and passengers must wear seat belts.



•Do not use a smart/mobile phone while driving a car or motorbike.



• If you drank alcohol



- Do not drive a car.
- Do not lend a car or motorbike to a person who drank alcohol or ask such a person to drive.
- such a person to drive.
 Do not encourage a person who is going to drive to drink alcohol.

How to see a doctor at a hospital

Go to a hospital or clinic.

What you must bring with you

- Health insurance card
- Referral form (only if necessary)

Submit your health insurance card at the reception desk.

Explain your symptoms briefly. Examples: "I have a stomachache." "I have a fever."



Wait in the waiting room until your name is called.

When your name is called, enter the doctor's office and explain your symptoms in detail.



After the consultation with the doctor, wait in the waiting room.

When your name is called by the receptionist, go to the desk and pay the medical fee.

Receive your prescription.

Go to a dispensary pharmacy, show your prescription, receive the prescribed medicine and pay for it.



• If you want to borrow a book

 Get a library card. It can be used at all libraries in Edogawa City.

What you need to bring with you Identification that shows your name, address and date of birth

(e.g., residence card and health insurance card)

Who can get a library card

- Those who live in Edogawa City,
- Those who work for a company in Edogawa City (employee/staff ID required), or
- Those who go to a school in Edogawa City (student ID required), etc.
- You can borrow 10 books or magazines, 3 CDs, and 2 DVDs respectively at the most.
- You can borrow them for up to 2 weeks.
- * This period can be extended by making a request to the library before the due date. It can also be extended on the library's website.

Returning books

- You can return the borrowed books to any library in Edogawa City.
- On days when the library is closed or it is outside business hours, you can return books by putting them into the Book Post (excluding CDs and DVDs).

Note!

If you write something on, tear, or soil a borrowed book, you may be requested to pay for the damage. Handle it with care.





Major traditional crafts made in Edogawa City



• Edo Kiriko (faceted glass)

Glass crafts with geometric patterns that have been produced since the end of the Edo period. Their characteristic is nostalgic but having new designs that express the four seasons and scenery in Japan using traditional patterns.

• Edo Furin (wind bell)

Glass wind bells that have been produced since the Edo period. The secret of the unique, beautiful sound they produce is to leave a jagged edge at the opening part of the bell. Beautiful pictures and patterns are all painted from inside.



• Edo Sensu (folding fan)

Its bold motifs and the simplest design where all unnecessary elements are eliminated are described as *iki*, or chic. The distinctive feature is that one craftsman performs all processes for producing a piece of work.

• Kumiko Zaiku (woodwork)

Without using even a single nail, fine pieces of wood are intricately put together with a technique that is as precise as 1/1000th of a millimeter.
