Code for the Promotion of an Intercultural City

Edogawa City established the Code for the Promotion of an Intercultural City on December 20, 2023. This ordinance plainly describes the philosophy of Edogawa City as a "multicultural city" where people of different nationalities and ethnicities can live together as members of local communities with the mutual understanding of and respect for cultural differences while seeking to build equal relationships.

Edogawa City is home to people born and raised not only in Japan but also in different countries and regions around the world.

People from different countries and regions have varying cultures, mindsets, and lifestyles.

For all people to live with peace of mind, it is important that they can recognize mutual differences and live in their own ways.

A city of diversity continues developing as a vibrant city because people from different cultures live in support of one another, thereby creating new cultures.

All residents live together as members of local communities while valuing mutual cultures — we have established this ordinance as a declaration of our goal to be such a multicultural city.



Quick Look at Edogawa

1. Kyunaka Riverside Kawazu Sakura



The riverside near the Sobu Line of the Kyunakagawa River, which flows north to south along the borders of Edogawa City, Sumida City, and Koto City, is a spot famous for the Kawazu Sakura cherry blossoms and is visited by many people every year.

It has become popular as a spot where you can take pictures of the beautiful Kawazu Sakura cherry blossoms with Tokyo Skytree® in the background. The Sobu Line runs in front of Tokyo Skytree®, and many people visit the spot to take pictures. At present, 36 Kawazu Sakura cherry trees are planted on the riverside of the Kyunaka River.

Kawazu Sakura cherry blossoms start to bloom

in the cold season, heralding the early arrival of spring

On the riverside of the Kyunaka River, blossoms start to bloom in early February every year, with the best season for viewing from late February to mid-March.

This area is also known as a waterside spot where you can enjoy canoeing and boating. You can also take a leisurely stroll.

2. Shinkawa Promenade with 1,000 Cherry Trees



"Shinkawa 1,000 Cherry Trees" refers to a famous cherry blossom viewing spot where 718 cherry trees of about 20 kinds, including Someiyoshino and weeping cherry, are planted for about 3 kilometers on both sides of the Shinkawa River. In the Edo period, Shinkawa flourished as a waterway for carrying various goods and as a "salt road" for carrying salt from Gyotoku. Although ships are no longer in service, a redevelopment project was completed in 2015 for making the historic Shinkawa area a cityscape full of Edo atmosphere by planting cherry blossoms along the promenade on both sides and establishing a fire watch tower and a pedestrian bridge.

In spring, a cherry blossom viewing boat is operated, and many people from inside and outside the City come to see the thousand cherry trees planted on the promenade from a Japanese-style rowboat. You can take a leisurely lapanese boat ride on the river to enjoy the

cherry blossoms that spread across both sides of the river.

3. Fireworks Festival



The Edogawa Fireworks Festival has been held since 1976, one of the largest in Japan with about 14,000 launches at one venue. Soke Hanabi "Kagiya" (2-chome Higashi-Komatsugawa), a long-established company with a history of more than 360 years since the Edo period, has been in charge of launching since the first festival. The festival is crowded with many spectators every year because they can enjoy powerful fireworks set off on the spacious riverbed up close without obstacles. The famous opening of the festival, where 1,000 fireworks are launched in five seconds, is extremely dynamic. After energizing spectators with the opening, fireworks are launched to BGM that match the image of each program. The festival is characterized by fireworks with thickness in many layers.

The fireworks depicting Mt. Fuji with golden crowns in the climax are breathtaking, setting a new Guinness World Record® for the "Tallest firework mountain."

The festival is supported by local residents and

many other people through donation boxes set up at facilities around the City.

4. Edogawa Citizens Festival (Tokyo Metropolitan Shinozaki Park)



The Edogawa Citizens Festival is the largest festival held in Edogawa City and attracts many people from inside and outside the City. The festival is aimed at promoting exchanges among residents and forming local communities and is planned and operated directly by residents. The festival is vibrant every year with parades by local kindergarteners and elementary school children in the venue, joint brass band performances by local junior high school students, and other performances by local high school students.

The festival is enjoyable for visitors of any age with a wide variety of events, such as petting small animals, flower sales events, traditional crafts, international exchange, and programs for children.

5. Koiwa Morning Glory Market

Edogawa City is famous for the production of the morning glory. It is said that about 70% of morning glory sold at Iriya Morning Glory Festival, a famous summer tradition, is produced in Edogawa City. Koiwa Morning Glory Market was started in 1990 to help people enjoy the atmosphere of a morning glory market in Edogawa City.

The shopping street is lined with about 700 pots of morning glory that are the pride of producers. The market is also vibrated with cherry drums, dance performance, and refreshment booths.

Come and enjoy the atmosphere of the morning glory market while walking around the town of Koiwa on a refreshing morning in early summer!

Shinohara Furin Honpo was founded in 1915 and continues to make Edo furin wind bells using the same manufacturing method as in the Edo period. Melted glass is attached to the tip of a thin glass tube and is expanded with breath. Visitors can experience making wind bells (fee and reservation required).



7. Shunkaen BONSAI Museum

In 2002, Mr. Kunio Kobayashi opened the museum in order to help many people enjoy the splendor of bonsai.

The building and the garden are filled with a Japanese atmosphere, and the entire museum is designed to help visitors enjoy the beauty of the four seasons.

In addition to experiencing bonsai, visitors can also experience the Japanese culture of the tea ceremony and kimono dressing.

The painting of Mt. Fuji is repainted once a year.

Daini Kotobuki-yu, one of the public baths in the City, is a historic sento founded in 1964. The noren at the entrance is original to Daini Kotobuki-yu and is changed seasonally. After entering the door, you will see bandai (a desk for collecting fees and keeping watch over the baths). Pay your fee at the desk. In Tokyo, only about 10% of sentoes still have bandai.

The large bathtub in the bathroom comprises a mineral bath and an electric bath. In the small bathtub, you can enjoy daily medicinal water. The large, spacious bathtub has an extraordinary atmosphere that is extremely pleasant and relaxing for the people soaking in the water. One of the features is the background painting of Mt. Fuji. In a traditional sento, you can take a bath while enjoying a painting of Mt. Fuji. The paintings are drawn by specialized artists. It is fun to visit various sentos to view different paintings.

If this is your first visit to a sento, ask the staff or other visitors what to do. They would be happy to kindly guide you! Body soap and shampoo are available. Enjoy the sentos, traditional Japanese public baths!

9. Kiki's Museum of Literature



The museum was opened on November 3, 2023, as a museum of children's literature to become a place for helping children to bear the future become familiarized with children's literature and nurture their rich imagination, while sharing the works and achievements of Ms. Fiko Kadono

In addition to Ms. Eiko Kadono's works, children's books and picture books from all over the world are on the shelves. With the wish to provide a collection of the most exciting books that children can choose and read through to the end, Ms. Eiko Kadono selected books in person. Children are free to choose books and read their favorite books on the spots that they like

11. Bust of Gandhi



The government of India donated a bust of Mahatma Gandhi to Edogawa City, where the largest number of Indians live, as proof of friendship and goodwill. Edogawa City examined candidate locations that are familiar to Indians and other residents and decided to install the bust inside the circular flower bed in a corner of the park specified below with high pedestrian traffic

The bust of Gandhi, including the pedestal, is 1.8 meters high and 60 centimeters wide, made of

bronze. It was created by Mr. Naresh Kumawat, an Indian sculptor. The unveiling ceremony was held on July 28, 2024, watched by local Indian and Japanese residents and with the participation of Mr. S. Jaishankar, Minister of External Affairs of the Republic of India, Mr. Sibi George, Ambassador of the Republic of India to Japan, and Mr. Takeshi Saito, Mayor of Edogawa City. On December 25, 2024, Edogawa City signed a comprehensive partnership agreement between the Indian Commerce and Industry Association of Japan and the Edogawa Branch of the Tokyo Chamber of Commerce and Industry with the aim of further developing the local economy and revitalizing community activities.

12. Kasai Rinkai Park

Big Ferris Wheel of Diamond and Flower



With a height of 117 meters, this is the second largest Ferris wheel in Japan and is a symbol of the park. On a clear day, you can see Tokyo Skytree®, Tokyo Tower, and other sightseeing spots around Tokyo, as well as Mt. Fuji in the distance. At night, the Ferris wheel is illuminated with full-color LED lights. A variety of colorful graphics are projected, which allow visitors to enjoy luminous night views.

Crystal View

Crystal View is an observatory rest house of a glass-walled building with a panoramic view of Tokyo Bay. It was designed by Mr. Yoshio Taniguchi, a master architect who has designed various modernist buildings both in Japan and abroad. Crystal View is characterized by the geometric form of about 75 meters wide and the glass-walled appearance and is a valuable spot where you can enjoy both the architectural beauty of Mr. Yoshio Taniguchi and the superb scenery of Tokyo Bay. The transparent design that blends into the sky is beautiful with spacious scenic views spreading beyond the architecture

From the observation deck on the second floor, you can see the Plaza of Kasai Rinkai Park and Tokyo Bay, as well as Boso Peninsula in the distance.

Lost property

There are many Koban (police boxes) in Japan. In each police box, police officers work to protect your life and way of life. If you lose something valuable or find a lost item belonging to another, go to a police box.



Fire

You must take special care during winter in Japan, when the air is dry and a fire easily breaks out.

To prevent fire

 Do not throw cigarette butts on the ground.



- Do not smoke in bed.
- Clean power outlets to prevent the buildup of dust.
- Make sure any fire or flame is extinguished before going out or going to bed.
- Do not use spray cans near naked flames.

If you find a fire

• Shout out, "Kaji-da! (Fire!)" to alert people around you that there is a fire.



- Call 119 immediately.
- Attempt to extinguish the fire using fire extinguishers or water.



- If oil catches fire, do not pour water on it. Use a fire extinguisher.
- If you feel you are in danger, flee immediately.
- If you need to escape through smoke, cover your nose and mouth with a wet handkerchief and keep your body low.
- Do not use the elevators. Use the stairs to evacuate

Disaster prevention at home



• Prepare to protect your safety.

- Prepare food and water for about three days to a week as well as batteries and a flashlight.
- Put the necessary items into a bag (emergency bag) so that you can take it out quickly if you need to evacuate.






























Secure the furniture to prevent it from falling.





Check dangerous places and shelters in advance.

Ask neighbors in advance to provide help if an earthquake or other disaster should occur.

Decide where you will evacuate in case of an earthquake or other disaster and simulate walking there as you would during a disaster.

The Flood Hazard Map shows the locations where there is a risk of flooding and where to evacuate. The Flood Hazard Map is available in a summary and in full text for more details provided in Japanese, English, Chinese, and simple Japanese. The summary is available at the City Office and Branch Offices. It can also be downloaded from the City's website.

When a wide-area evacuation alert is issued, a subsidy is granted for the payment to hotels outside the City used as shelters.

When a disaster strikes

- Typhoon and torrential rain
 - Stay in a building when there is torrential rain or strong winds.
 - If there is a risk of flooding from river water, evacuate beforehand with an emergency bag.

Earthquake

[If you are at home or in a building]

- Protect yourself by taking cover under a table, for example.
- After the shaking stops, turn off the stove and heater.
- Open the windows and doors immediately to secure an exit.
 Doors may not open after a quake.
- Before evacuating to outside the building, turn off the circuit breaker.

[If you are outside a building]

- Cover your head with a bag etc.
 to prevent injury caused by falling objects and flee to a safe place.
- In a residential area, move away immediately from concrete block walls, gates, and other objects that may topple or fall over.

 Resident registration (notification of your moving in, moving out, or change of address)

If you want to take up residence in Japan, you need to notify the local government. If any of the following applies to you, go to the Edogawa City Office or other branch office to complete the necessary procedures.

- If you live in Edogawa City immediately after entering Japan
- If you move to Edogawa City from another municipality
- If you move outside Edogawa City
- If you move within Edogawa City
- If you are qualified as a mid- to longterm resident in Japan

- Family register (notification of birth, death, marriage, and divorce)
 If any of the following applies to you, go to the Edogawa City Office or other branch office nearby to complete the necessary procedures.
- When a child has been born
- When a family member living in Japan has died
- When you get married in Japan
- When you divorce in Japan

For the procedures, your passport and some other documents are required.

Seal registration

A seal registered with a public organization, such as ward, city, town, or village, is called a jitsuin or a registered seal.

If you need to register your seal or need a certificate of seal registration, go to the Edogawa City Office or other branch office to complete the necessary procedures.

For the procedures, a seal to be registered and a residence card or special permanent resident certificate is required.

Words that you frequently see or hear when searching for a home

Fudosan-ya (real estate agencies)

Are businesses that introduce various homes to people who want to rent or buy a home. Visit and consult them when you look for a home.

Ohya (landlord)

Is a person who rents out a home. If you have any problems, consult them. They are called "Ohya-san."

Yachin/Chin-ryo (rent)

Money you pay each month for the house/apartment you rent

Rentai-hoshonin (co-signer)

A person who is obliged to pay rent when the renter is unable to pay the rent

Shiki-kin/Hosho-kin (deposit)

Is the money you pay for renting a home, at an amount equivalent to the rent for one or two months. It is used when the renter is unable to pay the rent or when the landlord fixes a damaged or dirty part of the room/apartment/house after the renter has moved out. The money the landlord did not use will be given back to you after you have moved out.

Rei-kin (key money)

Is the thank-you money paid by a tenant when renting is determined. at an amount equivalent to the rent for one or two months.

Chukai-tesuryo (commission to a real-estate agency)

Money you pay to the real-estate agency that presented the house/ apartment to you when you have decided to rent the property

Kanri-hi/Kyoeki-hi (common area charge)

Is the money paid for facilities used by all tenants in an apartment building or mansion. This money is collected from tenants to be used for electricity and cleaning bills in places used by all tenants, such as stairs and hallways.

• Koshin-ryo (renewal charge)

Money you pay in addition to the rent if you continue to live in the same house/ apartment after completing the term of your lease.



How to separate and dispose of waste

Household waste shall be separated into combustible waste, noncombustible waste, and resources.

Waste collection days are determined by area. Waste should be put out by 8 a.m. on the designated day of the week. For more information, see The Basic Rules for Sorting and Disposal of Garbage brochure.

Combustible waste

[Put out in a garbage container or transparent/translucent bag]



Food waste, waste paper, disposable diapers (remove dirt), clothing, edible oil (blot it with paper or cloth, or make it solid), tree branches, flowers (cut them into about 30 cm and bundle them together), dirty plastic waste with recycling symbols, plastic waste with silver-colored parts or without recycling symbols, and rubber/leather products

Noncombustible waste

[Put out in a garbage container or transparent/translucent bag]



Metal products the plastic parts of which cannot be removed, small home appliances less than 30 cm in length, china and porcelain, glass, knives, metals, dry batteries, spray cans, lighters (empty the lighter by burning off the fuel and separate it from other waste when taking it out), and light bulbs and fluorescent lamps (put them in paper cases)



COLUMN on Daily Life Manners in Daily Life

Things to note when you are looking for a house/apartment to live in

- 1. You may not allow others to live in the house/apartment you are renting without permission.
- It is very likely that you will not be allowed to have pets in an apartment. Make a check at the time of the contract.
- *If there is something you do not know, do not hesitate to ask your real estate agency about it.

Things to note for daily life

 Japanese people value relationships with their neighbors. Make a point of greeting your neighbors.

- 2. Walls in Japanese buildings are thin. Do not make loud noises in an apartment (loud voices, sound from the television, music, etc.). Do not make noise outdoors, either, because it will be a nuisance to your neighbors.
- **3.** Do not leave things outside your apartment (in a common area).
- **4.** Take off your shoes at the entrance of a Japanese house/apartment.
- 5. Keep your room neat and clean.
 - Do not pour food or oil into a kitchen drain.
 - Do not peel the wallpaper, put nails in the walls, or apply paint, or you will have to pay a substantial amount of money for restoration.

A local community in Japan has a neighborhood community association. It does various activities to make the community safe and convenient. *You are required to pay membership fees

What is good about joining such an association?

- You can help each other in the event of a disaster.
- You can prevent crimes in the community by getting to know one another.

- You can participate in events that you and neighbors can enjoy together.
- You can get various kinds of information concerning daily life in the community as soon as possible.

Customs differ from country to country.

Greetings in Japan

Morning "Ohayo gozaimasu"

Afternoon "Konnichiwa"

- In the workplace, touching colleagues' bodies must be avoided.

Tilt your upper body forward around 30 degrees. This is the type of bowing that is the most frequently used at all times.



Greeting with deepest respect

Tilt your upper body forward around 45 degrees. The politest bow Used to express deep gratitude or apology

Be on time and keep your promises.

Japanese people are punctual. A typical example is trains coming on time. They believe that punctuality is an expression of courtesy and should be observed without exception. Being late for school or work leads to the loss of credibility. If it is unavoidable that you will be late, tell others that you will be late.

Relationships with others

In Japan, older and more experienced people are often considered those who have contributed to society longer and are valued more than younger and less experienced people. Also, at school, use polite language for senior students. People also tend to keep some distance and become modest with people they meet for the first time. It takes time for them to develop a relationship from "acquaintance" to "friend" and then to one where they can say what they think and be straightforward with the other. Japanese people value harmony and cooperation and try to avoid guarrels where possible.

There is a Japanese proverb that says, "Courtesy is important even between intimate friends."

Be careful about ambiguous expressions

Japanese people tend to avoid unequivocal expressions but infer the intentions of each other from facial expressions and context. Phrases like "Iidesu," "Kekkodesu," and "Daijobudesu" can have opposite meanings and may be confusing even for Japanese. Japanese people also tend to avoid a conflict of opinion by using circumlocution instead of straightforward assertion. If you do not understand, check the meaning on the spot.

In Japan, softly suggesting "it may be better to…" is preferred to a straightforward assertion.



COLUMN on Japanese Culture Japanese Baths

In Japan, there are public baths called "sento" or "onsen." Edogawa City has many sentos. (See page 15 for information on a sento.)

Manners when taking a bath

- Wash your body before you enter the bathtub.
 - ⇒ This is to keep the hot water in the bathtub clean because it is used by all.
- Avoid splashing shower water or soap lather on the persons around you.
- Rinse the wash bowl and chair you used with clean hot water.
- Do not put your towel in the bathtub.
- Long hair should be put up.
- Wipe your body thoroughly before returning to the changing room.
- Do not use a washbasin or hair dryer for a long time when the changing room is congested.

Japanese Table Manners

Hold a bowl with your hand

In Japan, you should hold the bowl of rice or miso soup with your hand. It demonstrates poor manners to eat by bringing your mouth close to the food without holding the bowl (called "inugui (dog eating)"). You do not hold a large dish of Japanese food or a dish of non-Japanese food.






• How to ride

 Wait in line at the bus stop for your destination.




 The destination is displayed on the upper front part of the bus.

 Fixed fares may be collected when you get on, or incremental fares may be charged according to the distance to your destination. (A public transport smart card will be helpful.)



 Press the "Get off" button when you are approaching the bus stop of your destination.



Taxi

- How to ride
 - Go to a taxi station at a train station or hotel.



- When a taxi arrives, take the back seat. The door automatically opens, so you do not have to open it.
- Large luggage can be placed in the trunk. Ask the driver when you bring large luggage.
- When you get in, fasten your seat belt.



 Tell the driver where you want to go. (Only a few drivers speak foreign languages. If you are not fluent in Japanese, prepare something with your destination written on it and hand it to the driver.)






• When you arrive at the destination, pay the taxi fare to the driver.

- Where there is no sidewalk, walk on the right side of the road.




- If you want to cross the street, cross where there is a traffic light or use the crosswalk.
- Do not cross where there is a "no pedestrian crossing" sign.




< No pedestrian crossing sign >

 Then, make sure that the overall road conditions are safe before crossing.




- Even while you are crossing, check carefully if a car or motorcycle is approaching.
- Do not cross a railroad crossing when the alarm is sounding or the railroad crossing gate arm begins to descend.




Bicycle

Bicycles are in the same category as cars by law.



 As shown in the picture above, ride on the left side of the roadway.



- ↑ Wherever you see this sign, you may ride a bicycle on the sidewalks.
- Ride slowly so that you can stop quickly.
- If you are going to cause a disturbance to pedestrians, get off your bicycle or stop riding.

[You can ride on the sidewalks in the following cases]

- If you are under 13 years old, 70 years old and over or with physical disabilities.
- If it is difficult to ride a bicycle safely on the roadway.

Rules for riding bicycles

• It is prohibited for two persons to ride on one bicycle.



- * When carrying a child/children, use a bicycle specially designed to carry up to two children.
 - Do not ride alongside other bicycles.



• Do not ride a bicycle after drinking.



 Riding a bicycle gripping the handle with one hand only is dangerous.
 Do not hold an umbrella or use a smart/mobile phone while riding a bicycle.



 At night and when it is dark, turn the headlight on.



 All riders must endeavor to wear helmets when riding bicycles.

Bicycle Navigation Lines

What Bicycle Navigation Marks and Lines mean

These clearly show the part of the road that bicycles should use and the direction in which they should travel. Bicycles must travel in the direction of the arrow. (Going in the reverse direction is prohibited.) Bicycle Navigation Marks and Lines are designed to inform bicycle riders of the instructions on traffic specified in the Road Traffic Act in an easy-to-understand way and to increase their effectiveness.

They are not traffic signs that indicate new traffic methods or penalties.


Rental bicycles are available at 11 bicycle parking lots in front of railway stations in Edogawa City. The rental fee is 210 yen per day for a standard bicycle and 340 yen per day for a power-assisted bicycle. Bicycles can be rented and returned at any bicycle parking lots in front of railway stations. You need to make a bicycle-rental registration card. Bring your ID, such as residence card or driver's license, when you rent it for the first time

Car

- When you drive a car
 - the driver's license is required.



- Do not drive a car if you do not have your driver's license with you (if you left it at home, for example).
- Drive on the left side of a road.
 Drive slowly when you pass pedestrians or bicycles.



• All drivers and passengers must wear seat belts.



• Do not use a smart/mobile phone while driving a car or motorbike.



If you drunk alcohol



- Do not drive a car.
- Do not lend a car or motorbike to a person who drank alcohol or ask such a person to drive.
- Do not encourage a person who is going to drive to drink alcohol.



Who can get a library card

- Those who live in Edogawa City,
- A person who works for a company in Edogawa City (Employee ID is required)
- A person who goes to a school in Edogawa City
 (Student ID is required) and others
- You can borrow 10 books or magazines, 3 CDs, and 2 DVDs respectively at the most.
- You can borrow them for up to 2 weeks.
 - *This period can be extended by making a request to the library before the due date. It can also be extended on the library's website.

Returning books

- You can return the borrowed books to any library in Edogawa City.
- On days when the library is closed or it is outside business hours, you can return books by putting them into the Book Post (excluding CDs and DVDs).

Note!

If you write something on, tear, or soil a borrowed book, you may be asked to pay for the damage. Handle it with care.

The dynamic patterns and simple designs that eliminate waste are described as "iki (stylish)." It is also characteristic that only one craftsman handles the entire work process of a single fan.

• Kumiko Zaiku (woodwork)

Without using even a single nail, fine pieces of wood are intricately put together with a technique that is as precise as 1/1000th of a millimeter.


